Dear Mr. Canada:

I have been expecting to receive an answer to my telegram of February 11 in which I urged you to permit me to enroll in the University of Missouri for graduate work in journalism in view of the fact that Lincoln university has no school of journalism.

Since I have not heard from you, I am writing to ask you again to reconsider your statement of February 6 that you have no authority to admit me. Other University of Missouri officials say that you are the sole authority on matters pertaining to registration and enrollment.

As I told you when I was in your office on Wednesday, Feb. 5, registration day for the second semester of the current school year, Lincoln university is offering no courses in Journalism this semester. Because of this fact, I am asking admittance to the University of Missouri for graduate work in journalism.

If you will issue me a permit to enroll at once, I still will have time to enroll in this semester's classes without missing too much of the work already begun. I am enclosing a cashier's check for \$41.50 to cover my fees for the semester: \$30, incidental, hospital and library fee; \$6.50, journalism fee, and \$5, late enrollment fee. I sent the check last week to the university treasurer, Mr. R.B. Price, who returned it saying that enrollment fees are handled through your office. An attack of influenza has delayed my sending it on to you.
