Kansas City's Catholic College for Women

St. Teresa College is the only Catholic College for women in Kansas City.

St. Teresa's is the direct development of the first school in Kansas City, that established by the Sisters of St. Joseph sixty-two years ago in Father Bernard Donnelly's Immaculate Conception parish.

St. Teresa's is the culmination of the educational activities in this city of the Sisters of St. Joseph, who now conduct St. Joseph's Training School for Nurses of St. Joseph's Hospital, St. Teresa Academy, Redemptorist High School and Redemptorist parochial school, the parochial schools of Cathedral, Assumption, Holy Rosary, Our Lady of Guadalupe, St. Elizabeth's, St. John's, and Visitation parishes, and St. Joseph's Orphan Home.

The library, generously stocked with thousands of copies of literary masterpieces as well as books of reference on many subjects, affords opportunity for research and for leisurely reading.

Dramatics, formal and informal, give outlet to talents of expression and impersonation that more frequently produce comedy than tragedy.

St. Teresa's is located at Main and Fifty-seventh streets in handsome, modern, fireproof buildings on a campus of twenty acres. It is provided with all the facilities for its work which can be found in any public or heavily endowed junior college, and as an institution directed by religious has an atmosphere of refinement, culture, and elegance which larger and less carefully supervised institutions of its kind must lack.

St. Teresa's is a two-year college, or junior college, one of the four hundred regularly organized junior colleges that have been established within a quarter of a century in America, for the Junior College is a distinctly American institution.

St. Teresa's gives the basic courses necessary before the elective work taken up in the third year of college. In these two years of preparatory work are pursued courses which are a foundation for further liberal education as well as for professional and vocational training; in other words, the courses given at St. Teresa's are those given in the first two years of work at practically every college and university in the country, and are those demanded of the student before training can be commenced in law, medicine, dentistry, journalism, and other professional and vocational lines, and even before specialization can be begun in any of the academic branches, such as history, literature, languages, sciences, mathematics, and the like.

In the art studios work is carried on in various types of drawing and painting. Original designs are made in conventional and modernistic styles and are applied in numerous ways. At the same time by means of lantern slides, photographs, and other reproductions the great masterpieces of the ages are studied.

The courts and other athletic facilities on the campus provide for games and sports for all seasons of the year.

St. Teresa's, because it is adequately accredited, each year passes on some of its students to their third year of work in the standard colleges and universities in various parts of the country.

St. Teresa's offers the advantage of giving these two basic years of college work, not in a crowded university, but in a small institution where there can be developed a better type of teaching, more individual work, and better contact between instructor and student. This intimate contact between faculty and students fosters the fuller development of personality and of qualities of Christian leadership which is the peculiar aim of St. Teresa's.

St. Teresa's does not direct its efforts only to preparing students for further study, but gives a well balanced series of courses for those who do not or can not continue college work. These courses constitute adequate preparation for many interesting and highly profitable life occupations. For example St. Teresa's courses in education entitle students to the State Certificate to teach granted by the State Department of Education.

St. Teresa's gives its most serious attention, however, to developing a young woman not only able to make a living, but thoroughly able to make for herself a full, rich life a Catholic gentlewoman with accurate general information, broad interest, fine sense of discrimination, cultivated taste, and delicate moral judgment.

The gymnasium is daily the scene of free standing exercises and work with apparatus as well as indoor sports and group dancing.
