Dear Mr. Green:

Several days ago, two young ladies, together with a group of three from the local Central Trades Council, called on and presented me with literature concerning your company, and what they claim to be unfair labor practices.

The spokesman for this group was Miss Ruby Talbot, 624 N. 9th Street, St. Louis, Missouri, Organizer for the International Ladies' Garment Worker' Union. I am enclosing a copy of the pamphlet which they presented to me, and would like to know your side of this question.

Miss Talbot expressed the opinion that should immediately discontinue buying Nelly Don dresses in order to aid them in their fight against your company. She inferred that our failure to do this would make it necessary for their union to advise all local unions to put the Nelly Don dresses on their unfair list.

I explained to Miss Talbot that I thought there was always two sides to every question, and that before our company would take any action, we would like to know your side. We would, therefore, appreciate it if you would advise us concerning this.
