Gentlemen:-

We have just had a call from two young ladies who presented themselves as representatives of the National Ladies Garment Workers' Union. They presented us with pamphlets and other evidence purporting to show that Nellie Don was unfair to labor and particularly unfair to Union workers.

These young ladies requested that we write you urging that you deal with the Union, or with their representatives, with a view of reaching an agreement as to hours and wages of your employees.

We are not fully advised of the circumstances, but we do believe that the workers should be fairly treated in all industry, and that you should be willing to deal with your employees on a collective basis for a reasonable salary and reasonable working hours.

The young ladies who visited us "Miss Miller and Miss Bullard" indicated to us that if they were not successful in dealing with your company that they would go direct to the consumer, publicizing the fact that your company was unfair to organized labor. If this is done, it might mean serious trouble for your dealers, or the stores handling your merchandise.

During the many years we have done business with your house, our relations with you have been most pleasant and we believe profitable to both of us. We would like to hear from you regarding this matter, as we realize that there is always two sides to every story.
