Dear Mr. Mitchell:

Just received your letter today. Am glad the clippings interested you. I am sending you some more. Everything that happens appears in the newspaper and from them you can keep in touch with the political situation and know what is going on about as well as if you were here.

Milligan and Cochran are going after each other with hammer and tongs - - you scarcely hear of Truman's campaign at all. Pendergast never did hunt ducks with a brass band. It has always been hard to tell what he is doing, but easy to tell what he has done the day after election.

I understand Rufus Jackson, the Postmaster here, has never been confirmed by the Senate and if Truman or Cochran is elected to the Senate he will be fought. Bill Igoe, former Congressman, will be a candidate for Postmaster here. I understand the Cochran campaign committee here expects to devote their time out in the state, and expects each ward committeeman to carry his own ward.

As you have not yet heard from Mr. Melloit, do you think it would be alright for me to write him or do you think it would be better for you to see him again first, or wait until you hear from him before I write?
