Dear McCammon:

There is a possibility that you might be appointed Assistant Director of the Federal Home Loan Bank with headquarters at Springfield. I do not know what the place would pay but I should think from \$3,000 to \$4,000. You would have a good many employees under you which would give a chance to do something for our friends among deserving Democrats.

I suggest if you are interested in this place that you wire me or have Greenwade wire me and I will get very busy. Then you should have Jewell send telegrams to all Congressmen and to Bennett Clark urging your selection, also a telegram to Mr. W. F. Stevenson, Chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, and Mr. J. A. Fahey, Member of the Board. Then you should go to Kansas City immediately and see all of your friends there (especially Aylward, Kemper, Pendergast, and McElroy) and get them to send telegrams or at least letters, but telegrams preferred, to Mr. Stevenson, Mr. Fahey, James A. Farley, and Secretary Daniel C. Roper.

I am writing very hurriedly. Greenwade will see you in the morning when he arrives about 9:00 o'clock.

I do not know whether it will be possible to find anything for you here or not. It is very doubtful in view of the great pressure being put on by Senators and others.
