Independence, Mo. April 20, 1933

My Dear Sweetheart:

Yesterday was a big day. Got a letter from you and Margaret and you've no idea what a difference that makes. It must have been some rain. I wish that I'd been there to see it. Stayed at Independence last night and the night before. Fred wanted to go out and I stayed with your mother.

George came home last night and he looks fine. I was down there and stayed an hour. He is going to stay in until Monday and then go back to work.

Nat Jackson was in to see me and said that Natalie was just standing on her head to see you or hear from you. He
