Dear Bess:- Well I got in exactly on time yesterday morning. Vic tried to meet me but failed. He was ten minutes late and I was at the office when he got to the depot. I found at least a thousand letters here on all sorts of subjects - about half about Mrs. Roosevelt and the Court.

Bennett, I suppose will be in Kansas City Saturday. I told him if he was looking for a split in the Democratic Party he could very easily find it and perhaps now is as good a time as any to have it. His face got redder than it was and he said very emphatically that he

was not looking for a party split but evidently the Republicans were and so was Roosevelt whom he proceeded to blame for the condition. Same old story - he does not like the President.

Got my committee started off and will get through Thursday. If I get a wire from you I'll be on my way to go with you to Mississippi. I rather think it is the thing to do. I'm getting jittery and maybe a chance to sit down a minute would help.

Kiss Margie. I'm looking for a letter today. You won't get one until Thursday.
