POLICING THE SPEEDWAY

A COMPLETE Police Department, under the direction of Sergeant Newton V. Reynolds of Kansas City Police Department, is employed by the Kansas City Speedway Association to protect spectators from injury or crime. This complete police organization represents more than 300 men, or approximately one-half of the entire Police Department of Kansas City. The police organization is divided into two general divisions—police officers from the Kansas City Police Department and members of the 110th Engineers assigned to police duty on race day. The police system extends far beyond the limits of the Speedway. All of the important intersections, beginning at the south limits of Kansas City, and continuing on to the gates of the Speedway, are patrolled on race day to reduce congestion and to direct the many thousands of motorists bound for the Speedway. At the gates are scores of men giving their attention to directing the crowds to the proper entrances and getting them into the Speedway Plant in the shortest possible time. Once inside the gates the motorist is directed to a parking space and his party directed to their reserved seats or other space in the plant.

Motorcycle officers are assigned to ride the speed zone of the track to prevent the collection of crowds in case of accident to the drivers. Plain clothes men are assigned to posts throughout the plant to watch for pick-pockets or other criminals. One feature of the Speedway plant known to very few is the jail, a stone building located in the northwest comer of the Speedway property. This jail is provided to hold the peace disturber and petty offender. Those guilty of minor infractions are placed in the jail and held until after the race, when they are released. Those guilty of more serious offenses are taken to the County jail and held for prosecution.

ON Race Day the Speedway is a city in itself.

With an attendance estimated at anywhere between 70,000 and 100,000 persons, many of whom have entered the gates shortly after daybreak, all of whom will remain until evening, the great Speedway Plant has been turned into a busy center of activity. It therefore, becomes necessary to provide this suddenly created city with those things that great numbers of people must have for their convenience, comfort and protection.

Dr. Allen L. Porter, for many years a leading member of the medical profession in Kansas City, will be Chief Surgeon for the Kansas City Speedway Association, and in his keeping is the health and safety of the many thousands attending today's race. The Speedway Association maintains a completely equipped hospital, located under Grandstand "A". Dr. Porter has on his staff: Drs. S. B. Hibbard, P. H. Owen, John Hallberg, Morris B. Simpson, Rex Williams, who are specialists in all of the branches of medicine and surgery.

A corps of nurses is on the ground to assist the hospital staff. The hospital staff is concerned not only with the welfare of the drivers and their mechanics in case of accident on the track, but have in their keeping the treatment of any emergency cases among the spectators. In case a spectator is taken ill or is the victim of an accident on any part of the grounds, ask the nearest police officer for aid in getting

to the Speedway Hospital. Every care will be given to anyone needing this service.

## THE SPEEDWAY'S FIRE PROTECTION

EVERY part of the Speedway Plant is protected against fire. Chemical Extinguishers are placed at frequent intervals throughout the two Grandstands and around the track. Chemical apparatus from the Kansas City Fire Department is stationed back of each Grandstand and on the Infield facing the home stretch and back stretch.

In case a racing car should catch fire, the nearest chemical truck would drive into the safety zone and go to the scene of the fire. The same is true in case the fire occurred anywhere on the grounds.

The attention of the public is called to the fact that this is the first Speedway Plant in the world to erect steel Grandstands. While the floor and seats are of wood, all of the under structure is of steel, set on huge reinforced concrete footings. It is practically impossible for a fire to start in one of the Grandstands. Even if a fire did start, it could not spread because of the construction and fire extinguishers placed at convenient points, accessible for immediate extinguishment. The Kansas City Speedway, therefore, because of its fire resistive construction and fire protection, is the safest great amusement enterprise in America.

KANSAS CITY'S NEW HALF-MILLION DOLLAR SPEEDWAY

The Building of Huge Plant Has Been Accomplished in a Little Over Two Months—Many Factors Enter Into its Development.

KANSAS CITY'S new Half-Million Dollar Speedway, on which is staged today the opening 300- mile Speed Classic, has been the scene of feverish activity for weeks past, during which time those engaged in the development of this magnificent plant have worked unceasingly to have it ready for the Grand Opening.

As those of Kansas City's Motorists have driven into the grounds day after day, the expression frequently has been heard, "They can never finish it in time."

It has seemed an impossible task to the lay mind, but the engineers who designed the great track, grandstands and many other units, are used to having seemingly impossible tasks, and so, day after day grandstands for seating more persons than Convention Hall, have risen from the ground and 1000 miles of lumber have been unloaded from cars and formed into the wonderful track on which today's race is run.

The building of a Speedway plant is more than just the erection of grandstands and a track. It is true these are the fundamental units, but with them in order to make the plant as a whole, operative, thousands of dollars have been expended in score boards, telephone equipment, fencing, grading, drainage, sanitation, road work, signs, etc.

Kansas City's New Speedway is really the finest plant of its kind in the world. It is the first Speedway plant with steel grandstands, insuring safety against fire or collapse for its patrons.

The track is the most up-to-date and is declared by its builders to be the fastest board speedway ever built. The speed of the board track is determined by the amount of pitch at the turns, and the graduation of the elevation leading into the turns. There are more than 450 different degrees of pitch or elevation into the turns. The pitch of the track determines the speed of the course, in that when the driver approaches the turn he must either slow down or may go into it with his throttle wide open, depending on the extent to which the track is banked.

The Kansas City Speedway represents more than 1000 tons of steel, approximately five million feet of lumber, hundreds of tons of nails, thousands of tons of rock, sand and cement. The lumber, if stretched end to end, would reach from Kansas City to the Pacific Coast. The nails if laid end to end would reach far beyond Indianapolis, which is the nearest Speedway on the East. Entrance to the Infield is gained through three tunnels. The largest of these is tunnel "A" which is near the Holmes Street entrance, and provides passageway for three lines of automobiles, with separate compartment for pedestrians. Tunnel "B" on

the east side of the track may be used either as a pedestrian-tunnel or a passageway for a single line of automobiles. The third tunnel, with two passageways, goes under the bridge that carries the track over a draw at the north side.

The ordinary time required to build a Speedway plant is about four months. That the Kansas City plant has been built in less than three months, is due to the spirit of loyalty and personal interest shown by those who have had a part in its building. The Board of Directors of the Kansas City Speedway Association, desire to express their appreciation of the splendid service rendered by those whose names appear below:

Spitcaufsky Bros. Paving and Grading Company

When the Kansas City Speedway Association employed Spitcaufsky Bros, to take charge of the grading and excavating for the Speedway, it employed probably the largest and most responsible concern of its kind in the Middle West. As the result, an almost impossible task has been performed on time. Messrs. John and Hyman Spitcaufsky have given their personal supervision to the work from start to finish. When they began their task the Speedway site was largely an undrained tract of ground. The first month of their activity forced them into mud and made the task seem hopeless. There was no time for delay, however, and they kept at it ditching, draining and drying the ground before they could work it. The importance of grading and drainage may be easily seen when the thousands of cars, parked on the Speedway grounds today are viewed. Without perfect drainage these cars would be stalled in case of rain. In order to carry off the water in case of a sudden rain, and make it possible for the spectators to leave the plant without trouble, practically every foot of the 192 acres has been turnpiked into a series of roads, one joining the other. The ditches between roads have been so sloped as to carry off the rain. The Badger Lumber Company has fought the railroad strike from start to finish in getting to the Speedway plant the millions of feet of lumber ordered from Southern mills. Time and again cars have been lost in the freight yards and it has been necessary to send tracers, but from the time the lumber contract was let to the time the last load was delivered, remarkable service has been given.

The Kansas City Structural Steel Company is entitled to its share of praise for the designing, fabrication, delivery and erection of the steel for the Grandstands.

\* The Whiteline Transfer Company is another of the loyal associates of the Speedway Association in its construction program. Of this company W. M. Clayton is the head, and because of freight rates it was found necessary to truck the majority of crushed rock, sand and cement into the plant and the great fleet of Whiteline trucks has kept the army of workmen busy in spite of rain and mud.

# FRANK WAGNER STARTER IN ACTION

# HOW THE BIG RACE IS RUN

5EF0RE Starter Fred Wagner waves his red flag as a "go" signal to the drivers after they have been paced around the track into a flying start, countless details will have been overcome by the management of the Kansas City Speedway in order that the start can be made possible—details that would never occur to the spectators.

For more than six months, there has been an army of workmen on the speedway site, never stopping for a moment in their efforts to have finished on this day what is accepted as the finest speedway plant in the world. At the same time the business office of the Speedway Association at 921 Walnut street has been a beehive of activity. There the directing hands of the gigantic undertaking have sent out the orders that make it all a reality.

From the day the entries for the great classic

were opened, more than two months ago, until the advance ticket sale opened, all energies have been directed to the first 300-mile international speed classic ever run on an American speedway, which is held under the supervision of the American Automobile Association, the governing body of the motor car racing world.

Two weeks ago the drivers began arriving at the track. Then started the ceaseless preparation for the race. Their cars were unloaded and tuned up for the tremendous test to which they are put on race day. The tuning up processes reveal certain faults; the cars are torn down and rebuilt, the error corrected; day after day the process goes on. It is said that a racing car is never ready—never completely satisfactory to the exacting driver.

Then come the qualifying trials. The fastest

eighteen cars are entered. If there are less than eighteen, a minimum speed of one hundred miles an hour for four laps is necessary to qualify. Following this qualification the drivers themselves

must pass a rigid physical examination and in other ways give evidence of their ability to drive 300 miles at the terrific speeds the race will develop.

The cars are then thoroughly inspected to see that they do not exceed the piston displacement of 183 inches, and to establish absolute proof that vital parts, such as the front axle, including all steering connections, have been replaced at least two days before the contest. The final inspection is the brake test and sampling of the gasoline. These measures, and many others, are designed as means of eliminating all possibility of accident.

The arrangements for the safety of spectators are most complete. With such vast throngs as will attend the Kansas City race, such measures must be carefully worked out and the plans executed by trained and skillful leaders. It is necessary to employ hundred of guards. Traffic lanes must be kept open; parking spaces must be carefully watched to prevent congestion; crowds must be kept moving to their seats; information must be supplied to thousands every hour of the race. The guards are under the direction of a trained officer who has two hundred competent aides. Their fingers are on every artery of the great crowd from early morning, when the first arrivals begin filtering in, until an hour after the race has finished when the last of the thousands are departing. In addition, scores of plain clothes officers must be on hand to guard the spectators against sneak thieves and pickpockets, who are always drawn by crowds.

A complete hospital with a staff of physicians and trained nurses is maintained at the speedway, where facilities for every case are provided. In this opening event, the speedway staff has been augmented by several physicians and surgeons, members of Kansas City American Legion posts, who volunteered their services for the day.

The operation of the great speedway plant on race day is a highly intricate undertaking. Back of the whole scene, and out of view of the spectators is the speedway manager, his finger on every pulse beat. He has not only the great race, involving more than \$30,000 in prize money, to think of, but the comfort and safety of the huge throng which has traveled out to see the contest. For six months his every waking moment has been given over to this day, and it is not merely good fortune that the race starts on scheduled time and that everything runs a smooth course, but more the result of careful planning and clear vision.

Watch the starter for signals. The red flag is the start and means a clear course. Yellow is a warning to slow down; white, stop for consultation; blue, accident on the track; green, starting last lap and then—the greatest flag of all—the checkered flag, spelling victory.

Probably his start was made when as a youth he rode motorcycles until one day after exceeding the speed limit, the judge, who incidentally was his uncle, fined Jimmy \$10 and costs and thereby took all of Jimmy's spending money for a month. But little matter. It is said that Jimmy has made more than \$50,000 this year winning so many races. He finished first at Union- town and again at Tacoma. JIMMY MURPHY, the smiling Los Angeles youth, has had one of the most meteoric rises to fame on the records of automobile racing. It was but just a short time ago that he was riding beside Tommy Milton as the latter's mechanic, and to Jimmy's credit it may be said that he was as an efficient mechanic as he is a successful p'lot. When he decided to change to the driver's seat, he did not require any great length of time to start chalking up his victories. It wasn't long before little Jimmy startled the world with his memorable exploit in winning the rich Grand Prix at Le Mans last year in which race he defeated not only the greatest drivers of Europe but the fearless Ralph De Palma also.

## **ROSCOE SARLES**

OSCOE is one of the "clowns" of the racing game. He has more genuine fun out of the sport than almost any of the well known drivers. Sarles has

earned the sobriquet of "Battling Roscoe," because of his ability with the gloves. Roscoe is an amateur boxer of considerable ability, and, in addition, is credited with a wicked game of golf, swims splendidly, is champion of the Race Drivers Hand Ball league, bowls, and is one of the most successful nim- rods in the country. Roscoe shoots like the old frontiersmen and can earn his living any time as an expert marksman.

Roscoe is a native of Indiana and long before he entered the list of the world's great drivers was a steady attendant at the Indianapolis speedway. He has had more spectacular spills than any of the active drivers, yet despite his many mishaps has always escaped without serious injury.

Whenever Sarles starts he can be depended upon to give the winner a hard tussle for victory. Roscoe had "hard luck" at Indianapolis this year as his big Frontenac was finally withdrawn because of motor troubles.

#### JOE THOMAS

JOE is one of the favorite drivers of the country.

He has had the misfortune this year of having to withdraw from several big races because of sickness that came on during the course of the race. At Fresno and at Indianapolis Joe suffered this fate. Swarthy of complexion, with dark, piercing eyes, Thomas is always noticeable around the speedway. Joe delights in posing among strangers as a foreign driver and in the parlance is very successful in "getting away with it." He was born in Seattle but under the tutelage of Rene Thomas, the great French pilot, Joe acquired a familiarity with the French language that aided him materially in carrying out his deceptions among "the gang".

Joe is one of the veterans of speedway racing, and it is said there is no pilot who is more in love with the thrill of the game than Thomas. Moreover he is one of the greatest natural drivers who ever sat behind a steering wheel.

Each driver has been given minute instructions by the starter as to how the race shall be driven. THE track of the new Kansas City speedway is built to permit the greatest speed ever attained on a circular course anywhere in the world. The speed is a matter largely I regulated by the construction of the turns. \ When they are banked sufficiently high /, drivers can negotiate them without diminish- i ,, ing speed. Accordingly the time of the race is determined, in this manner, by the speed permitted when rounding the turns.

An angle of forty-two degrees has been allowed on the turns of the Kansas City i \* track. This is the highest ever built and If will sustain the full speed of any racing car 4 yet developed without shutting off the power in any way.

A Section of the Steel Grandstands.

THE GRANDSTANDS

THE Kansas City Speedway is the only one in the world possessing steel grandstands. They were erected at a great cost, but this expense was justified by the knowledge that it provided the greatest insurance possible for the safety of the thousands of spectators who will flock to the races held here every year.

In addition to the feature of safety, the height of the grandstands affords spectators with a remarkable view of the entire speedway plant. At the highest point in the grandstands one is eighty feet above the track level and is thus given a wonderful panorama of the entire track, infield and pits. On no other speedway is this feature equaled.

Each stand seats approximately 15,000 persons. The construction was carried on with the end in view of affording the greatest possible comfort to spectators. It was for that reason that the long, wide passageways were built throughout the grandstand, and the promenade aisle at the foot of the reserved seat section in grandstand "A." Spectators will not be discomforted by the constant crowding and passing of others going to and leaving their seats. These are just little details of the grandstand construction, but small as they may be they have been designed as a means of contributing to the comfort and enjoyment of everyone who comes to see the races.

ELLIOTT'S progress in the Kansas City race will be watched with more than passing interest when it becomes known that he is a native of Lath r op, Mo., just a few miles from Kansas City. He has a host of friends in this part of the state and long before he achieved fame as a racing pilot he had established a well earned reputation as a football and basket ball player. Frank recently broke the 50 miles speedway record with his "Leach Special" on the speedway at Cotati, and barring mechanical trouble will surely be one of the strong contenders for first place in the race here.

One would scarcely know Frank around a track; he is quiet and unassuming giving himself over entirely to the business in front of him, viz;that of having his car in condition to stand the gruelling test of a long speedway race. Elliott not long ago went through the thrilling experience of having his motor drop out of his car while traveling at a furious speed. The motor rolled down the incline to the apron of the track, while the body of the machine, Elliott and his mechanic clung tenaciously to the guard rail.

Frank arrived with his car early—several weeks before the big race here—and spent several days visiting at Lathrop.

READING THE SCOREBOARD How to tell the position of the cars and distances they have traveled at any time during the race.

TWO great scoreboards, one facing each of the grandstands, show the position of each car at all times during the race.

Every car, you will notice, is numbered. Corresponding numbers appear on the scoreboard. Directly below these numbers the lap numbers are placed each time the cars cross the line. Elsewhere in this program is listed the number of each car and driver as well as pictures and history of the drivers.

Select your favorites and make the race more interesting by watching their progress as they put mile after mile behind them at a rate of speed far in excess of 100 miles per hour.

On the great scoreboards back of the numbers are young men, each assigned to handle one particular car. The duty of each of these young men is to watch the car assigned to him and each time it crosses the line add one more number to the total laps.

The scoreboard facing Grandstand "A" is connected by telephone with the timing-stand where the director of timing and scoring and chief scorer are watching each car number and the laps credited to it. In case one of the scorers should make a mistake it is corrected at once by telephone.

The scoreboard facing Grandstand "B" is connected with Grandstand "A" scoreboard by a system of telephones. Each scorer at the scoreboard being connected directly with the man scoring the same car on Grandstand "A" scoreboard so that the corrections are made instantly on both boards in case of mistake.

During every minute of the race both score- boards are constantly checked by the director of timing and scoring and chief scorer so that no mistakes will remain on either of the boards more than a few seconds.

Thus when the winner crosses the line receiving the checkered flag, the spectator can tell immediately how many laps other drivers have to go to get in the money or finish.

In addition to the scoreboards, the time and distances traveled are announced frequently during the race by announcers in front of both grandstands.

In front of Grandstand "A" is the Press-stand in which are representatives of Kansas City papers and correspondents of other papers from many cities. Telephones and telegraph send the news of the race to the press throughout the world and before the race is ended millions of readers have before them accounts of the running of the race and names of the leaders at different points before the finish. As a result of the most complete press bureau service at the Speedway the name of the winner is flashed to newspapers throughout the United States directly from the Speedway Press-stand the instant he crosses the line. The official score of the race is kept by hand, the time of the cars by electrical timing device. The official position of the first five cars is shown on the scoreboard, at the extreme right, by special numbers.

To make the race more interesting by eliminating the necessity of frequent reference to the program it is suggested that the spectator memorize the car numbers and drivers so that when the race starts he recognizes that a certain number means Murphy, Milton, Elliott or some other favorite. By memorizing the names of drivers with car numbers the spectator can give his entire attention to the excitement of the race.

BUILDING THE KANSAS CITY SPEEDWAY

CONSTRUCTION of a great, modern speedway plant is a highly specialized undertaking. It is a task demanding the most skillful engineering, the most experienced building knowledge and at the same tm'e a thorough understanding of the likes and dislikes of the race drivers who will hurtle their mounts over the track. For after all, if the board track is not to the liking of the pilots, a speedway plant cannot function. The drivers will refuse to race on it, if they are not completely satisfied that it offers them full opportunity of obtaining the maximum speed of their cars without taking unnecessary

chances with their lives.

With that in view the officers and directors of the Kansas City Speedway cast about for the most experienced and skillful speedway builders in the world. Their choice was unanimous. John S. "Jack" Prince, for many years champion bicycle rider of the world and designer and builder of the world's finest board speedways, was selected for the task. Prince is known throughout the length and breadth of the automobile racing world. He built the first board speedway track in the United States, a simple little affair for bicycles. Later he developed those tracks into bowls on which the famous six days bicycle races were held. The evolution of board speedways was again developed by Prince for motor cycle racing.

Then came the automobile speedway. Prince built the first one at Los Angeles and the motor world was shocked with surprise when a racing car negotiated a considerable distance at a speed of more than 100 miles per hour—an undreamed of feat on a circular track.

Prince has built the great speedways, not only at Los Angeles, but San Carlos and Cotati. In every one he has embodied the long experience and knowledge gained through years of speedway building. Kansas City stands as his latest triumph and in this track Prince has combined the countless lessons and knowledge gained through the construction of the others. Working with Prince has been A. C. Pillsbury, of Los Angeles, recognized as the foremost speedway engineer in the world. Upon Pillsbury's shoulders fell the responsibility of erecting the mammoth grandstands, of building miles of roadways, constructing the tunnels through which traffic, both foot and vehicular, flows to the speedway infield under the racing track itself. Pillsbury was charged with the delivery of the completed plant in time for this great race. It was a tremendous assignment and one that had to be rushed from the day it was given him. Less than four months were required by Pillsbury and Prince in the entire construction of the great Kansas City Speedway.

The amount of materials used in building the plant are staggering to the imagination. As an example, more than 4,000,000 feet of southern pine alone was necessary. The timbers used, if laid end to end, would stretch out over the nation for more

than 1,000 miles. To deliver it from the southern mills where it was sawed for the speedway required 175 freight cars.

Night and day since June 1, the speedway has been the scene of intense activity. More than 500 men were employed at one time on the work. It is difficult to realize that less than six months ago the site of the huge plant was a great farm divided into fields of corn, pastures for cattle and horses, undisturbed by any sound save those of nature.

NO end of comment has been aroused among the thousands of persons who live in Kansas City and those who are familiar with the topography of the city and its surroundings over the site of the great speedway. Kansas City has a reputation throughout the nation for its hills, and the idea of locating a tract of ground sufficiently large for a one and one-quarter mile speedway track, without overcoming tremendous obstacles in the way of hilly country was remote. But the speedway site offered the exception—probably the sole exception. It was comparatively unknown to a large majority of people in this vicinity as being removed from the highway the site had escaped attention. However, when the officials of the Kansas City Speedway Association announced that the main tract—that on which the racing bowl and grandstand were to be constructed —comprising 160 acres was so level that a difference of but four feet in grade from one end to the other existed was almost beyond belief.

The speedway has been pronounced by many as one of the most ideal in America. The great tract constitutes almost a virtual amphitheatre. Surrounded by hills on the north and an eminence on the south and west, the main tract of 160 acres seems to have been designed by nature for the purpose to which it has been set by the Speedway Association. It is in the heart of one of the most beautiful sections of Jackson County, just 10 miles South of Kansas City and but a short distance removed from the southern limits of the city.

THE "Junior Specials", the only Kansas City ,ars entered for the big race, have an interesting history. They were built last year by a wealthy young oil man of Kansas City especially for the Indianapolis race. The pair was constructed right here in Kansas City, virtually every part, except the tires, being made in one of the most wonderful work shops ever designed for motor car building. A quartette of the most expert motor car builders were imported for the task and when the cars were completed their cost approximated \$50,000.

Upon arrival at the Indianapolis track they were pronounced the most beautiful racing cars ever seen there. One of them went over the rail during the race and the other after giving splendid account of itself went out with motor trouble. They were purchased this year by George S. Wade, of Kansas City, and rebuilt especially for the Kansas City race. Watch the "Junior Specials".

THE AMERICAN LEGION AND THE SPEEDWAY

THE story of the American Legion's participation in the great 300 mile international speed classic on the new Kansas City Speedway is an interesting one. Early in May the idea of a formal dedication of the speedv/ay by the American Legion of Missouri and Kansas was proposed to the officers and directors of the Kansas City Speedway Association, who were agreeable to the plan. It was the purpose to dedicate the great track with a ceremony participated in by national officers of the Legion and those prominent in local affairs. The stellar attraction would have been an internationally known driver who would have attempted to low'er the world's record for 100 miles.

The plan was broadened however, to permit the American Legion to participate actively in the opening race. E. E. Peake, secretary and general manager of the Speedway Association, and his associates, realizing the efforts constantly put forth by the officers of the legion to obtain funds with which to provide for the hundreds of needy cases among the veterans of the war, finally decided that it would be thoroughly appropriate and timely to permit the American Legion of Missouri and Kansas to participate in some way in the opening race and thereby derive sufficient revenue to meet this ever present situation, at least for some time to come.

The plan met with a hearty response from all quarters and led to the formation of the American Legion race committee, composed of state officers, and representatives of the various legion posts of the two states of which there are some 800. The legionnaires of the states were enthusiastic over the prospect and no end of praise has been received by the officers of the Speedway Association for making it possible.

# WHO'S AHEAD NOW?

SPECTATORS in Grandstand "A" and Grandstand "B" will notice a grove of trees near the north turn of the track.

When the Speedway Plant began to take form there was a question whether the small forest at this point should be entirely removed. After many conferences the management of the Speedway Association and engineers decided that a few of the trees should remain. There are two reasons for leaving this small grove:

First; the racing drivers are hidden for an instant and the spectators will wonder as they flash behind the trees whether the position of the cars will be changed as they come out.

Second; the roar of the exhaust is deadened for an instant, then again bursts forth as the cars pass out from behind the trees.

It is estimated that drivers will make a lap of the track in thirty-five to forty seconds. At this speed the few hundred feet obscured by the trees, will seem so short a space that it would be impossible for a change in position within that distance. However, when three or four racing cars, traveling at 115 to 125 miles per hour, and all within a few feet of each other, disappear behind the trees there is every likelihood that there will be a change in position.

So, the management of the Speedway believes the small grove that has been left standing will increase the tense interest in the race.

John S. Prince.

THE name of Jack Prince is synonymous with the modern board speedway; for Jack is the man who originated the idea of automobiles racing on wooden tracks constructed in saucer like form and twelve years ago he built the first speedway. It was at Playa Del Rey, Calif., a short distance from Los Angeles. The track was a one mile affair and with high banked turns. When Jack said 100 miles per hour could be made on the speedway his statements were ridiculed, but one memorable day the motor world received the shock of its life when Barney Old- field traveled ,..., . slightly more than

100 miles in an hour's time on the track.

Since that time Jack has done nothing but build speedways. At Fresno, San Carlos, Cotati and Los Angeles the great speedways stand as a tribute to the Prince Construction Co. Associated with Prince is Fred M. Johnson, secretary and treasurer of the firm. Mr. Johnson has been right with Jack on the ground every minute during the erection of the Kansas City Speedway track. Jack's claim to fame is not limited, however, to his success in building speedways. Long years before automobile racing was dreamed of, Jack was a world's champion. For fifteen years he was the greatest bicycle rider in the world, and his record of a mile in 1:52 accomplished on one of the old style bicycles is acknowledged as a wonderful achievement. Jack has riden bicycles and motor cycles in every country of the globe and it was in that way he started the construction of wooden racing tracks.

The evolution from the tiny little saucer for bicycles to the great plants for modem racing automobiles has covered a period of thirty years, and today the Kansas City plant stands as the finest and most modern that all of those years of experience and knowledge have developed. THERE is scarcely an automobile racing driver, mechanic, or in fact, any individual connected with the great sport who does not know "Art" Pills- bury. Wherever motor car racing abounds in the United States there Art's name is respected. Because Pillsbury is one of the men who are directly responsible for the development and success of speedway racing.

Art came from Los Angeles, went out to the site of the speedway plant, looked it over, called his aides into consultation and within a few hours told the speedway officials just what would have to be done to deliver a completed plant in time for the big race September 16.

It was a tremendous undertaking, and Pillsbury knew when he started that the task would demand untiring and ceaseless effort.

Railroad strikes, delayed material ship- ments, including weather, these and countless other problems have arisen during the days of the Speedway building. Pillsbury met each one of them with a grim determination and always triumphed.

\$8,000 INSTRUMENT RECORDS MOVEMENTS OF SPEED CREATIONS.

IN the excitement of watching the big automobile race, where lives and fortunes are at stake every second from the drop of the starter's flag until the last car finishes, the public often marvels at the fact that the officials are able to furnish absolutely accurate and frequent detail records of the time, distances, etc., of each car.

To the layman in the grandstand everything connected with a big race appears like one vast volcanic eruption, a cannonade of heavy artillery, with the spitting forth of fire and smoke, gasoline fumes and burning rubber, through which the demon cars burst past the line of vision (time after time until the flag falls at the crossing of the winner). Then, who knows "how fast?" Only the official starter, judges, timers and drivers themselves realize the importance of the little wire which a few of the spectators have noticed stretched across the track at the starting and finishing point.

As each car passes over this wire its performance is "officially" recorded by means of one of the most delicately constructed devices ever manufactured.

There are only two of these devices in America. One is owned by the veteran Starter Fred Wagner, whose fame is world wide. It is this race-timer built for and owned by Fred Wagner that is used in timing the 300-mile Speed Classic at Kansas City, and it is the official timing device of the American Automobile Association (A. A. A.). These timing devices cost over \$8,000 each. The entire outfit of the Warner Electric Horo- graph as this timing apparatus is called, consists of a wire stretched across the track and fastened at one end to an electric break-maker. Next, a time-registering device run by motor and a battery; also, a Bliss Chronometer, which is probably one of the most expensive clocks ever made, this part of the outfit alone costing \$1,000.

The operation of the device is as follows: As a car passes over this wire, which is elevated about an inch above the track, it depresses it. This action makes a "break" in the electrical current and this break causes the timing device to operate.

This timing device may be compared to a typewriter, with the exception that, on a typewriter the key strikes against the paper and ribbon resting against the pad, while on this machine the operation is just reversed. A long strip of paper is run through the machine and passes under a marking ribbon. Raised above this is an arm or striking pad.

The car in passing over the wire, breaks the electric connection. This "break" causes the marking pad to strike the strip of paper resting over the raised numerals on the edges of the discs. Thus is imprinted on the paper the precise "time" as shown by the exact position which the discs may be at that instant. The machine then automatically

shifts the paper along ready to receive the next impression, which will be caused by the next car passing over the wire.

As the first car makes the circuit of the track it automatically records the precise time that the lap is made in.

A relay fitted within the device prevents the back wheels of the car from registering, but this relay does not prevent the registration of two cars which might pass over the tape within 5-100 of a second of each other.

This whole race-timing device is so intricate and it is so delicate in its nature that the work of its construction was placed with C. H. Warner, an expert and authority on magnetic type instruments.

# **EDDIE HEARNE**

EDDIE is one of the real dyed-in-the-wool veterans of the racing game. He was riding to fame years ago with such luminaries of the speed world as Oldfield, Chevrolet and others, who have long since stepped aside for the younger pilots. But not so with Eddie. So long as he can sit behind a steering wheel just so long will the popular Hearne continue to drive racing automobiles. He is the personification of youth, despite the handicap of a bald head and birthdays, the number of which is a closely guarded secret with him.

Eddie finished third this year at Indianapolis after driving one of the prettiest races ever seen on the Hoosier speedway. In a giant Ballot he doggedly fought off the dozens of ambitious pilots who suddenly rushed for the lead. Eddie can safely be counted on to drive a hard, consistent race and when the victor has been announced it will be seen that Hearne has been in the race, if Eddie himself has not finished first.
